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REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

Soon, the IIHF will enter a new era. And after observing the discipline, unity, and cooperation shown by the IIHF its members, and partners in two turbulent seasons, it is a comfort to know that this federation is in good hands.

> Last season was about adapting and overcoming serious challenges placed on our sport. We achieved this, thanks to hard work, clear communication, and a level of cooperation that demonstrated the IIHF family's ability to put disagreements aside and work together when our sport needed it the most.

> After the COVID-19 pandemic shut down most of the season in 2019/2020, we prepared for the next season with a sense of purpose and optimism. Despite our best efforts, after long discussions with participating teams, tournament organizers, and health authorities, we had to accept the reality that we could not realistically host a complete World Championship program in 2020/21. Sadly, most of our members had to go through yet another season without international hockey.

But during this past season we saw some light at the end of the tunnel. Following the Council decision to cancel the lower division tournaments, the women's top division U18 World Championship, and all club and Challenge Cup of Asia events, the IIHF had to focus its efforts to ensure that the top division events – so important to the financial well-being of the IIHF and its members – could take place safely.

This meant a whole new rethink of how to host an international ice hockey tournament. The concept of a tournament "bubble", introduced during the National Hockey League's 2020 summer playoffs, was adapted and modified into a workable solution that was then executed with great success during the 2021 IIHF World Junior Championship.

Using the best practices from the World Juniors, the IIHF and tournament organizers were then able to successfully run tournament operations for the 2021 IIHF Ice Hockey U18 World Championship in Frisco & Plano, USA, and the 2021 IIHF Ice Hockey Word Championship in Riga, Latvia.

We hit an initial bump in the road with the Women's World Championship, which was scheduled to be held in Halifax, Canada but had to be cancelled due to a government decision. But thanks to a willingness on the part of the IIHF, the teams, and the organizer, we were able to relocate and reschedule the tournament in a matter of weeks.

The results of all these bubble preparations? Four tournaments, zero positive cases during each event, zero cancellations, all games played and all medals and trophies awarded. It was not easy, but together we showed what can be possible with dedicated people from all sides working behind the scenes.

There was positive news elsewhere across the hockey world. Facing cases among players and staff, pauses in play, and other difficult challenges, many leagues still managed to finish their seasons. Through the pandemic we have developed a good understanding of tournament organization under restrictions that we never faced before, and I am impressed with the adaptability displayed by the ice hockey family. It was a good opportunity to learn from each other and share knowledge.

I especially cannot say enough about the hard work that went into the successful operation of these events. Creating a tournament in a bubble environment is not easy, and I want to take a moment to recognize the incredible contributions of the IIHF office.

Whether working overtime at the office or at home during the pandemic, the staff were called upon to deliver over-the-top services to our membership. This they did with 100% commitment, enthusiasm, and support, and I am grateful to have them in the service of the IIHF and its member national associations as we go into the next season and beyond.

RENÉ FASEL (SUI) PRESIDENT

Born on 6 February, 1950 in Fribourg, Switzerland. Graduated from the University of Berne. As a referee officiated 37 international games including the 1980 IIHF World Junior Championship in Helsinki. In 1985 became the President of the Swiss Association and in 1986 was elected to IIHF Council. Former chairman of both the IIHF Referee and the IIHF Marketing Committees. Chairman of the Coordination Commission for the 2010 Olympics in Vancouver. IIHF President since 1994, member of the IOC since 1995 and elected to its Executive Committee in 2008. Recipient of the French Legion of Honour Award in 2004. Recipient of Russia's Order of People's Friendship in 2011.

KALERVO KUMMOLA (FIN) VICE PRESIDENT-EUROPE & AFRICA

Born on 21 November, 1945 in Raisio, Finland. IIHF Council Member since 1998. Elected Vice President in 2003. Managing Director of the Finnish Hockey League between 1975 and 1987. Board Member of the Finnish Ice Hockey Association since 1975, Vice President in 1990 and President in 1997. Member of the IIHF Sport Committee from 1982 until 1998 and Finnish delegate to IIHF Congress since 1976. Born on 29 March, 1953 in Trois-Rivières.


ZSUZSANNA **KOLBENHEYER (HUN)**

Chairwoman of IIHF Women's Committee since 2013. She is married and has three children.


RON DEGREGORIO (USA)

VLADISLAV TRETIAK (RUS)



Born on 25 April, 1952 in Orudievo, Russia. As a goaltender Tretiak won three Olympic gold medals (1972, 1976, 1984) and ten World Championships (1970-1971, 1973-1975, 1978-1979, 1981-1983) with the Soviet national team, and nine European Cups and 13 Soviet championships with CSKA Moscow. He was acknowledged best goaltender of the century during the IIHF's 100-year anniversary. Tretiak was in the International Olympic Committee's Athletes' Commission between 1981 and 1991 and worked as a goalie consultant for the Chicago Blackhawks between 1991 and 2003. He was an assistant coach of the Russian national team at several occasions including the 1998 and 2002 Olympic Winter Games. Tretiak has been a member of the Russian State Duma (parliament) since 2003. In 2006 he was elected President of the Ice Hockey Federation of Russia, a position he has held since. Resigned from Council position in March 2021.

HORST LICHTNER (GER) GENERAL SECRETARY



Born on 31 August, 1959 in Essen, Germany. Started as a personal assistant to the President of the German NOC, Dr. Daume and went on to leading marketing positions in various sports companies (ISL, CWL, TEAM). In 2001, he joined the German Football Association as Marketing Director, Became General Secretary of the IIHF in 2006. In 2007 he became General Secretary of the AIOWF. IIHF ANNUAL & EXTRA-ORDINARY CONGRESS RIGA, LATVIA 5 JUNE 2021

IHF President, René Fasel, opened the 2021 IIHF Annual Congress with a short speech and welcomed all present.

He particularly thanked Life Members Philippe Lacarrière and Frank Gonzalez for their presence in the Congress room, and all other Life Members for their presence online.

Then, a moment of silence was held for all members of the ice hockey family that passed away since the last IIHF Congress.

Lastly, the IIHF President welcomed Mr. Philippe Blatter and Mr. Bruno Marty, and the entire Infront team, to the Congress.

A roll call was executed by the General Secretary. Prior to starting the roll call the General Secretary explained that presence for this Congress could be both online and in-person.

Notice of the Meeting & Formal Extra-Ordinary Congress Procedures

IIHF General Secretary, Horst Lichtner, confirmed that the 2021 Annual Congress Meeting was called and notified in accordance with IIHF Statute 14.4; the IIHF provided notice and purpose of the 2021 IIHF Annual Congress with the First Notice being sent out on April 8, 2021, and the Second Notice being sent out on May 6, 2021.

The General Secretary explained that the subjects dealt with during this 2021 IIHF Annual and Extra-Ordinary Congress, were strictly limited to the topics explicitly indicated on the 2021 IIHF Annual and Extra-Ordinary Congress Agenda.

Appointment of Minutes Keepers and Scrutineers

The General Secretary proposed to appoint Adriaan Wijckmans and Enid Gyoerke as minutes' keepers. In addition, in case a vote would occur, Raeto Raffainer (SUI), Gleb Karatayev (KAZ) and Johan Bollue (BEL) were requested to act as scrutineers.

Congress confirmed the appointment of Minutes Keepers; and Scrutineers.

Approval of Minutes from Last Congress

The General Secretary announced that the IIHF Office had not received any written remarks to the minutes. Congress raised no objections and the Minutes of the 2020 IIHF Extra-Ordinary Congress were unanimously approved.

Report of the President

The President started his report by looking back at the 2020 season and stated that it was a very difficult season. For example, the cancellation of last year's World Championship which was supposed to take place in Switzerland was a big sacrifice. However, the President highlighted that the IIHF had an insurance in place which covered the income that was lost due to the cancellation of this Championship. The decision to take on this insurance was made by the IIHF Council in 2010 as a consequence of a risk analysis. This insurance ensured that the IIHF received 23 million CHF which allowed the IIHF to cover for all the Championships that it had to cancel due to the COVID-19 pandemic in the 2020 season.

The President went on to indicate that during the summer of 2020 it became clear that it would be impossible to organize the Semi-Annual Congress in St. Petersburg, during which a new IIHF Council was supposed to be elected. Therefore, the elections were postponed and an additional year was added to the current IIHF Council's mandate.

In the fall of 2020, together with the Expert Group, the IIHF realized that it would become impossible to run all the Championships during the season. Therefore, the focus was placed on the organization of the top events. However, the U18 Women's World Championship could unfortunately not be organized as, following a discussion with the Swedish Ice Hockey Association, the risk was too high.

The President especially thanked all members of the IIHF Council. Namely, this season, the IIHF Council had a total of 45 meetings, which never happened before. In addition, the President thanked the IIHF Staff for all their work during the season.

The President came back to the U20 World Championship which was held in Edmonton, Canada. He thanked Luc Tardif and Frank Gonzalez for their willingness to be the chairmen of that tournament despite the strict quarantine requirements which were in place. He thanked Hockey Canada for the organization of the successful tournament.

He then indicated that the U18 World Championship was a little bit more challenging regarding the costs. However, this tournament was also a great success, especially because there were no COVID-19 cases throughout the entire Championship.

The President then spoke on the World Championship in Riga. The lead-up to the Championship was very challenging due to the political questions that had to be solved. He explained that, together with the IIHF General Secretary, he visited the Belarussian President which unfortunately led to a lot of political discussions. Finally, despite the fact that the IIHF tried to use the platform of the organization of a World Championship in a country as an opportunity to bring people together, a decision was made not to play in Minsk, Belarus.

The President thanked the Latvian Ice Hockey Federation to do everything possible to have all of the 16 teams play in Riga. This meant that a temporary arena had to be constructed in the Olympic Center in Riga with the help of the government of the city of Riga. In addition, he thanked the IIHF Facilities Working Group for their excellent job with the ice rinks.

The President went on to talk about the issues that occurred regarding the Belarussian flag. He stated that it was not acceptable that someone removes the flag of a member of the IIHF family. The IIHF would fight for any of its members if they would take their flag away, and that is also what the IIHF did in this case. He indicated that sport and politics should be kept separately and that in the world of sport we have to stick together. Based on the obtained information through the Event Tracker, it was decided to cancel all Events except for the U20 World Championship, U18 World Championship, and Men's World Championship, which were successfully delivered during this season. In addition, the IIHF was absolutely ready to deliver the Women's World Championship, but due to the decision of the authorities of Nova Scotia, this event also had to be cancelled, which really came as a shock.

The President then said that the Authorities of Nova Scotia decided, one day before the teams were supposed to travel to Canada, With respect to the organization of the 2021 IIHF World Championnot to have the Women's World Championship. Lasty, the President indicated that the IIHF will organize the 2021 IIHF Semi-Annual Congress in St. Petersburg, Russia. The IIHF already spoke with the Russian government in order to ensure that a minimum of restrictions would be in place for that Congress. The President expressed his hope that everyone from the hockey family can join the Congress so that a new IIHF Council and President can be elected in St. Petersburg.

Report of the General Secretary

The General Secretary went on to say that the IIHF is currently preparing for the 2022 Beijing Winter Olympic Games. However, the last in-person meeting that the IIHF was able to have with the organizers was in September 2019. He stressed that the organization of this Olympic tournament, hopefully with the NHL players participating, is a huge undertaking, especially as all of the meetings are to be held virtually. For example, in November last year the first virtual site visit was conducted together with the NHL, NHLPA and BOCOG, which is a very unusual for doing these types of things.

The General Secretary indicated that the IIHF has built a studio in its offices in Zurich, which is not yet ready. However, this permanent studio will allow the IIHF to connect with anyone around the world at any time. The studio will be used to maintain the contact with the MNAs and Organizing Committees during these times when having in-person meetings is less feasible.

Report of the IIHF Activities

The President asked the IIHF Council members if they had anything to report regarding the activities that took place during the 2021 season:

Petr Briza indicated that over the last years a couple of projects were running, such as Partnership for Progress and the Growing the Game Fund, but all of these projects were paralyzed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Therefore, in cooperation with the IIHF Office, a new platform named "Skills for All" was launched. This platform is not only to be used for development purposes, but also for several other topics such as marketing, medical... The next Skills for All session will take place on the 9th of June.

Franz Reindl thanked all MNAs on behalf of the Competition and Coordination Committee for their readiness to have video meetings whenever that was needed. He said that the committee had worked hard on finding solutions for the different problems that were caused by the pandemic and that it came up with several proposals for the IIHF Council, especially regarding relegation and promotion, IIHF World Ranking and the max. players on a team for the WM20

Ron DeGregorio commended the IIHF Staff, and in particular the IIHF Legal Department for their hard work and smart risk management.

Sergej Gontcharov explained that for the first time, a new approach was used for the officials during the 2021 IIHF World Championship. Namely, the officials were working in units in order to limit the risk of COVID-19 infections.

Kalervo Kummola indicated that the Czech Republic had to step down regarding the organization of the 2022 WM18. He therefore thanked the German Ice Hockey Federation for taking over the organization.

Thomas Wu said that he was looking forward to the IIHF Championships taking place in the upcoming season.

Ratification of Urgent Decisions by Council

There were no Council decisions to be ratified.

Allocation of IIHF Championships

The General Secretary explained that a lot of tournaments had to be cancelled in the 2021 season due to the COVID-19 outbreak. He mentioned that the organizers of the cancelled tournaments had the right of first refusal to apply again to host these cancelled events which most of them used.

Slovenia is the only applicant to host this Championship Division.

Iceland is the only applicant to this Championship Division. Congress unanimously appointed Iceland as host. Reykjavik, 18.04.2022 - 24.04.2022.

2022 IIHF ICE HOCKEY WMIIIA

Luxembourg is the only applicant to host this Championship Division. Congress unanimously appointed Luxembourg as host. Kockelscheuer 02.04.2022 - 09.04.2022

2022 IIHF ICE HOCKEY WMIIIB

South Africa was the only applicant for this Championship Division. Congress unanimously appointed South Africa as host. Cape Town, 21.03.2022 - 24.03.2022.

2022 IIHF ICE HOCKEY WMIV

Kyrgyzstan is the only applicant to this Championship Division. Iran was tentatively added as a participant to this Championship. The decision on Iran's participation will be made during the 2021 IIHF Semi-Annual Congress. Congress unanimously appointed Kyrgyzstan as host, Bishkek, 03.03.2022 - 09.03.2022.

2022 IIHF ICE HOCKEY WM20IA

Denmark is the only applicant to host this Championship Division. Congress unanimously appointed Denmark as a host. Horsholm, 12.12.2021 - 18.12.2021.

Olympic Winter Games

The President indicates that there are still a lot of uncertainties surrounding the organization of the Olympic Winter Games. It is not even sure whether the Games will take place, let alone if spectators can be present in the stands. Therefore, the IOC has a huge challenge in front of them.

The President said that 70% of the athletes only participate once in an Olympics. Therefore, the upcoming Summer Olympics in Tokyo will be the only chance for many athletes to participate in an Olympic Event.

The President went on to say that the IIHF is working closely with NHL and NHLPA, BOCOG, IOC regarding the Olympic ice hockey tournament. The President indicates that he hopes to have a decision soon on the participation of the NHL players 2021/2022. (See Enclosure 12.1) during the Olympic Games.

Regarding the participation of the Chinese national teams, the President explained that the IIHF Congress decided to give them a spot at the Olympics. The President indicated that the Chinese ice hockey association is working very hard on having competitive teams on the ice.

Lastly, the President indicated that on the women's side we will have 10 teams for the first time during the Olympic tournament.

Luc Tardif added that there is still a lot of uncertain income regarding the Winter Olympic Games. This makes it a very hard task to figure out the provisional budget, irrespective of whether the NHL players are participating.

Risk Analysis Presentation

Rene Fasel thanked the Auditors for their help.

General Secretary presented the 2020/21 Risk Analysis (see Enclosure 11) as the following:

He mentioned that a full risk analysis is planned to be done every four years, and the last time it was performed was in the vear 2015/2016. The Risk Analysis of 2020/2021 is a reassessment of the risks that the IIHF has already known, and the IIHF's current environment. He informed that the IIHF mandated an external company for this analysis, and under the guidance of Roger Boccali (company) interviews were conducted to analyse the situation.

He then explained that it is the obligation of the IIHF to understand and analyse the risks. He summarized the risk analysis procedure and the legal requirements. He explained the outline of the approach, and the 5-step approach by IIHF to monitor

and identify the potential risks with the goal to reduce the potential threats. The General Secretary mentioned that currently the biggest risk is the COVID-19 pandemic which is influencing the operational success of the tournaments. Finally, he reflected on the outlook for the future, where good governance is key, and the risk analysis needs to be managed on a regular basis

Finances

BUDGET FOR THE UPCOMING YEAR

The Congress was asked to approve the budget, and to separately approve the Beijing Olympics aspect regarding the budget.

Luc Tardif gave a presentation on the Budget Season

He summarized the most important topics as the following. The IIHF has had another extra-ordinary season, with the cancellation of 28 tournaments, the cancellation of the Continental Cup Program, the postponement of the Olympic Qualification tournaments, and the financial impact on the IIHF due to the re-allocation of WM and ban of spectators. This meant no spectators in the Arena, so that the whole income source for the WM organizer is eliminated. This resulted in the IIHF stepping up as co-organizer & funding partner for the main portion of operational costs. On the positive side the World Championship, the World Junior Championship, and the World U-18 Championship could be played. Luc Tardif referred to the pandemic development, and reflected on the challenges of the IIHF Operations for the Budget Season 2021/2022. He then summarized the major challenges besides COVID-19, and highlighted the possible participation of the NHL players at the upcoming Olympic Winter Games in 2022. He finally said that due to the uncertainty regarding the 2022 Olympic Winter Games, he asked the Congress to approve the IIHF Budget 2021/2022 excluding the Olympic Games related figures and to give the Treasurer together with the Council and the IIHF Office the mandate to calculate the budget for the 2022 Olympic Winter Games in Beijing separately. The overall consolidated Budget for the season 2021/2022 will then be presented at the Semi-Annual Congress in St. Petersburg.

Congress approved the Budget Season 2021/2022 as well to continue with the Olympic budget as proposed

Approval of Financial Report Season 2019/20

In accordance with the IIHF Statues and Bylaws, the IIHF's Internal Auditors have audited the yearly accounts of the International Ice Hockey Federation for the fiscal year 2019/20. Based on this report the IIHF auditors recommend to the Congress the acceptance of the report of the external auditors and the discharge of the President, the General Secretary, and the

He then gave an overview on the proposed flat fee that will newly apply for the Council Members. He explained that the flat fee covers the expertise and willingness to take over the risk (exposure of liability) and the responsibility for the strategic, governance and financial matters of the IIHF as well as all mandatory assignments for Council Members.

Anvar Omorkanov (KGZ) said that he found it very unfortunate that politics affected the sport of ice hockey. Namely, he reflected on the recent WADA decision in the case against RU-SADA which led to Mr. Vladislav Tretiak stepping down as IIHF Council Member. He indicated that politics should not interfere in sports. He suggested that Mr. Tretiak was named as Life Member of the IIHF Council.

Extra-Ordinary Congress

IIHF President René Fasel opened the Extra-Ordinary Conaress

The Unified Rule Book was extensively covered in Congress during the Unified Rule Book session held on June 3rd, 2021.

Unified Rule Book

The IIHF General Secretary verified whether the MNAs that were missing during the Role Call had joined in the meantime.

A total of 115 votes was present. 64 votes were present inperson, and 51 virtually.

Congress unanimously approved the IIHF Unified Rule Book and review as presented.

Asian Strategic Planning Group Report

Although the prevailing epidemic continued to disrupt the staging of Challenge Cup of Asia, ASPG Meeting, knowledge exchange, the summer training camps etc, the bonding among ASPG Members remains strong, and it is most encouraging to see the sportsmanship demonstrated by our Asian Members in striving to live with the challenges and getting ready to shine on-ice again when the time comes.

Plans and construction of new ice rinks continued in the region including China, the host of the 2022 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games; Hong Kong; Kuwait; Macau, Mongolia and Thailand despite the epidemic, and there are even growths in Hockey reported, for example New Zealand and some of the new Members, attributed to the strong passion and concerted effort of the MNAs.

Looking ahead, a series of programs and activities is in the pipeline and the exchange between Asia and other members of the Hockey family will continue and be strengthened.

Coaching Committee Report

The 2020-21 season continued to be very challenging and prevented the Coaching Committee to run any in-person meetings, which had an impact on the usual in-season operations. With safety being the highest priority, this year's coaching symposium couldn't take place during the past 2021 IIHF WM in Riga (LAT).

The first Coach Developer Program was postponed and will be ready to resume when the pandemic situation will allow so. This program is so important for the National Associations to deliver good coach development in their countries using the idea of "coaches for coaches".



Autumn 2020 saw the successful launch of the IIHF Development Hub; which also features the IIHF Coach Development Framework (CDF), created to assist Member National Associations launch coach development systems and programs. The CDF will help in build or enhance these systems/programs. However, it is not the intention of the IIHF to provide a "one size fits all" coach development model. Instead of a list of best practices, the CDF outlines the best principles to be utilized and implemented by each MNA according to their own environment. This approach recognizes that each MNA's circumstances are unique because of different cultures and requirements of local authorities such as governments or National Olympic Committees.

The CDF also provides the foundation to the IIHF to run its educational programs such as the IIHF Coach Developer Program, development camps and seminars. The IIHF Office, together with the Coaching Committee, will continuously develop this publication, and welcomes feedback from our membership.

Thanks to the Committee Members for their continuous support in various other IIHF projects like the new 2021/2022 IIHF Rule Book and the Skills4All webinar series. It has been a most unique 18 months, and the fact remains, COVID-19 is still with us, which prolongs the uncertainty of what we can accomplish in the coming year. However, let me be clear: the player / coach relationship remains the most important of any in hockey, and the coaching committee stands ready to provide leadership to that end.

With that said, the influence of a new governance structure and IIHF leadership will play a significant role in determining the direction of all committees including of course coaching. We look forward to contributing to the needs of the game worldwide through coaching.

Competition & Coordination Committee Report

The past 2020/21 Championship season saw many tournaments cancelled and only the World Junior Championship in Edmonton (Canada), the WM18 in Frisco/Plano in Texas (USA) and the 2021 IIHF WM in Riga (LAT) operating as scheduled. All events have been organized in a bubble configuration to make sure to create a safe environment for all participants and officials.

The 2021 IIHF Women's World Championship had to be postponed twice and was finally played in Calgary from August 20-31 in the WinSport Arena of Hockey Canada.

Within the 2020 IIHF Championship Program:

• 28 tournaments and a total of 415 games needed to be cancelled due to the ongoing spread of the coronavirus (COVID-19)

• 4 IIHF Championships & Qualifications with a total of 151 games could be played and operated around the world under the IIHF banner:

For the past season, the Committee structured and seeded the 2021 IIHF Championship Program with 211 entered teams in 32 individual championships with 566 games in our 5 categories as follows:

After a year's delay, the Final Men's Olympic Qualification ended with Slovakia, Denmark, and Latvia earning a trip to the 2022 Olympic Winter Games in Beijing.

The Women's 2022 Olympic Winter Games Qualification program had to be postponed to the beginning of the 2021/22 season with tournaments in August, October and with the Final Olympic Qualification Tournaments in Czech Republic, Germany and Sweden scheduled for 11-14 November 2021.

In regards of qualification for the Olympic Winter Games the Committee also recommended Council that if one or more of the final tournaments cannot be played, the teams will be qualified based on their World Ranking position in 2019 (this has also been agreed with the IOC).

Should one or more teams need to be replaced at the actual 2022 Olympic Winter Games, the highest second ranked team(s) of FOQ based on their World Ranking position in 2019 would qualify.

The past season the Committee has been again very active with • 2022 Olympic Winter Games – Overtime Bronze and Gold various topics. Through the operation of various conference calls the Committee focused on the following action items:

· Recommendations on how to handle questions about Top Divisions Tournaments in regards of minimum number of teams, promotion/relegation etc

• Recommendations to Council on force major Cancellation of IIHF Championships due to Coronavirus i.e. relegation/promotion, seeding, World Ranking

• Reviewing the IIHF World Ranking 2021 Men & Women in regards of the special circumstances of tournaments not played for two seasons and also about number of teams participating in the championships and the maximum of points available (1200) Currently points are given to a maximum of 56 teams. When this was introduced, there were only 45 teams, now we are at 56 teams. Extending from 1200 to 1600 points will allow to rank up to 76 teams. Note: points would be recalculated for all four years in the calculation starting with the 2022 IIHF World Ranking

• If an MNA does not appear at the allocated IIHF Championship or is disgualified, they will be granted no World Ranking points. In case of force majeure, the MNA will receive points as per their seeding number. However, in case an entire tournament is cancelled due to force majeure in a tournament in 2021 or after, each MNA of that tournament will receive points as per their pre-championship report position coming into the tournament

• Recommendation to accommodate international transfers in the exceptional situation and extend the deadline to March 1, 2021

· Committee recommends increasing the official roster exceptionally for this season's WJC from 20 players + 3 Goalkeepers to 22 players + 3 Goalkeepers, because of the bubble concept in Edmonton with no possibility to exchange players after the arrival in Alberta

2021 IIHF WM Riga – Review of the WM Ice Making in Riga

The IIHF Facilities Working Group ice specialists were put in charge to supervise and setup the WM ice in Riga, together with the local ice management. The big challenge was to convert the football field in the Olympic Sport Centre (second WM venue) to an ice rink with not more than 3 months left to the start of the WM. The Facilities Working Group ice specialists (Manu Varho, Jeff Theiler and Antoine Descloux) under the leadership of the Facilities Working Group Chairman Frank Gonzalez, were spending many days in Riga to make it happen.

The Latvian LOC went out for a tender process to find the most suitable company for the delivery of the material and the setup of the ice rink. Finnish companies IcePro and Suomen Tekojää was chosen to setup and to deliver the ice rink for the Olympic Sport Centre. Their commitment with IcePro's Tomi Hukari in the lead was excellent, and with the help and the great support and cooperation of the local ice management, the WM ice was perfect in both, the Olympic Sport Centre, and the Riga Arena (main venue). The feedback from the IIHF President and the WM Directorate as well as from the players and the coaches was vast and especially the ice quality on the converted ice rink in the Olympic Sport Centre was praised. The perfect ice for the worldwide best players was created.

The Facilities Working Group has setup a specification and a budget in regards of low-cost ice rinks to serve our Member National Associations. With this budget, which can be modified, depending on the manpowerand or material costs in different countries, ice rink builders get a useful tool to work on and to calculate on

Instead, the IIHF Hall of Fame Class of 2020, who were initially planned to be inducted in a ceremony at the cancelled 2020 IIHF World Championship, will have their induction ceremony at the 2022 World Championship in Tampere, Finland.

The committee will reconvene in fall 2021 to review its mandate and make preparations to bring back the IIHF Hall of Fame ceremony to the World Championship.

Medical Committee Report

The 2020-2021 season brought many new normals with it as the Coronavirus global pandemic continued to dominate our personal lives and all our activities. Ice hockey was heavily impacted worldwide but as always sport was amongst the first things to bounce back after nearly one and a half years of standstill.

The IIHF Medical Committee held numerous Zoom meetings to deal with the COVID-19 pandemic and developed a template and COVID-19 protocol for organisers of the different championships. Unfortunately many of the Championships were cancelled due to the pandemic but the template and protocol were used successfully in the 4 major Championships - WM, WM 20, WM 18 and the WW.

In close co-ordination with the Medical Committee and a dedicated compliance team, the IIHF was able to host three hugely successful tournaments in the 2020-2021 season, starting with the U20 top division in Canada, the U18 top division for the boys in the United States and the Men's Worlds in Latvia. We were also happy to contribute to the safe delivery of the twice postponed Women's Worlds in late August 2021 in Canada. All these tournaments were organized under the strictest protocols, testing and guarantine rules in order to ensure a safe environment for ice hockey's top athletes to return to the ice. Having to adhere to national and international travel and guarantine restrictions certainly poses many challenges for both the local organizers and the IIHF but the Medical Committee is always there to provide the latest know-how on ensuring the safety of these events.

Members of the IIHF's dedicated team of medical supervisors were also present at all of these events, working in close co-operation with the IIHF and local compliance officers as well as the local medical teams. This is a particularly challenging time for medical personnel around the world so the commitment of our medical supervisors is even more appreciated and we continue to look at expanding our pool to be able to serve all IIHF events in the best possible way.

The Medical Committee also contributed heavily to the new Unified Rule Book of the IIHF with the safety of the players as our utmost concern. Special rules and restrictions are implemented in order to provide the safest playing conditions for all, including female players and youth players.

The Coronavirus pandemic also prevented the IIHF from organizing its Integrity Workshops during the World Championships. However, in order to ensure that the players continued to be educated on these important topics (e.g. Anti-Doping) an online education platform was created. The platform was very well received and was heavily used during the U20, U18 and Women's World Championship. In addition, to support the IIHF education program, a new video laying out the Doping Control Process has been produced. This video explains step-by-step what can be expected during a doping test, and should fully prepare each player for this procedure.

Officiating Committee Report

Game Official Assignments

The Game Official Team is a team made up of many different nations. The diversity of nations mixed with the many different regulations of these nations makes it very difficult to bring this team together in an orderly fashion and organize it accordingly.

Due to the strict COVID-19 requirements of the organizing countries, travel restrictions and the protocol developed by the IIHF Medical Committees regarding travel restrictions and guarantine regulations, the nominations of the Game Officials were also affected - a special and detailed planning was necessary.

It was very important for the nominations and assignments that the quality of the Game Officials is guaranteed also in times of a reduced game operation in the individual countries. The Game Officials had to follow the exact same guidelines as the players and team staff participating in the tournaments. An extraordinary amount of additional time for Pre-Travel Quarantine,

Self-isolation at the venue was required of those called up.

New Quota System and Licensing Process for **IIHF Game Officials**

The Game Officials are the one impartial element on the ice that is crucial to ensure the good course of each ice hockey game. Namely, with their performance, they have a significant impact on the fairness and safety of the game. Therefore, the Game Officials play a fundamental role in the attractiveness of the sport of ice hockey.

It is evident that having in place a clear IIHF Game Official Licensing and Nomination process is of utmost importance to assure the quality of the IIHF Game Officials. This allows the IIHF to assign the best available Game Officials to its competitions. In addition, such process ensures opportunities for new Game Officials to grow and develop in their roles through international experience.

In order to fully achieve this objective, a close cooperation between the MNA Referees-in-Chief ("MNA RIC") and the IIHF is essential. Therefore, with these Guidelines, the IIHF will extend the role of the MNA RIC. In this respect, the IIHF trusts that the knowledge and expertise of each MNA RIC, in addition to the realistic expectations, career planning and strong commitment by all stakeholders, will significantly contribute to the success of the IIHF Game Official Licensing and Nomination process. The new quota system is designed in such a way that the number of licenses that can be applied for by the MNA's is based on the available tournament and games of the 2022 IIHF Championship program.

The World Ranking of the corresponding MNA has a direct influence on the quality and quantity of Game Official licenses. However, if an MNA does not have the quality of Game Officials available, the quota will not be exhausted. An A-License can only be applied for if the given licensing criteria are fulfilled. One criterion is that the Game Official must have already worked in an IIHF Championship tournament and received a positive evaluation from the Officiating Coach.

The new IIHF Official Rule Book – the Unified Rule Book

Ice Hockey is a fast, attractive game with skilled players, emotions, great moves and body checks - clearly structured and understandable rules are essential.

The rules should connect players, coaches and game officials with a unified and clear structure language and interpretation - not disconnect them because of different rules and consequent misunderstandings.



Action:

Working with the same rules and implementing the same guidelines within the European professional top leagues.

Working the games with a harmonized, unified IIHF Rule Book - adapted to a level of professional ice hockey.

New process creating and establishing a Rule Book that is less political and involves more expertise.

This Unified Rule Book was recently approved by the 2021 IIHF Annual Congress and was created during the last few months by a specially appointed Rule Book Writing Group comprised of experts from IIHF and European professional leagues and in consultancy with the National Hockey League (NHL), the Rule Book was developed using the combined Official Playing Rules of the IIHF, the National Hockey League (NHL), KHL, and various European leagues.

It aims at harmonizing the rules across the world and for different levels and categories of play and ensure consistency.

Player Safety Committee Report

Following the successful completion and launch of the 2018-2022 IIHF Rule Book, the Player Safety committee worked with the IIHF Officiating Committee to develop informational resources to inform various stakeholders of the new rules.

The Committee was subsequently involved with the development of the new IIHF Rule Book that was released in spring 2021. The Unified Rule Book was reviewed closely by the committee to make ensure that the adoption of rules from the NHL and other leagues stayed in line with the standards for player safety in all IIHF tournaments.

The Player Safety Committee also recognized the need for key ice hockey organizations to become more closely involved in the development of the IIHF Rule Book. It is also important that the Rule Book should become a more fluid and versatile document, that can integrate new rule changes and sport regulation changes in a faster way instead of the usual four-year cycle.

To this effect, the committee conducted a review of the IIHF Rule Book proposal process, and submitted a selection for proposals to the IIHF Sport Department and the IIHF Council. Moving forward, the committee will evaluate the best practices of various player safety bodies around the ice hockey world. and come up with a set of strategic proposals for the IIHF in order to maximize the committee's influence in improving the safety of the sport.

I would like to sincerely thank all of the members from the Player Safety Committee, the IIHF Committees, the MNAs, and the various leagues and clubs for their hard work and their commitment to player safety.

Women's Committee Report

The IIHF's women's hockey program and the whole world was heavily impacted by the global pandemic throughout the 2020-2021 season. This meant the unfortunate cancellation of almost the entire female championship program as well as the signature events of women's ice hockey, World Girls' Ice Hockey Weekend and Global Girls' Game.

All this hardship culminated in April 2021 with the last-minute cancellation of women's hockey's top event, our top division world championship which was due to take place in Halifax and Truro, Canada. This was a huge blow to the ten teams who prepared in sometimes very difficult, restricted conditions to be able to perform their best on the highest level. However, the commitment of Hockey Canada, the IIHF and the participating nations ensured that a new location and new dates were fast confirmed for the event, August 2021 in Calgary, Alberta, Canada, giving the teams a much-needed top competition ahead of a very important Olympic qualification cycle and the Olympic Winter Games in Beijing, China in February 2022.

Youth and Junior Development Committe Report

During the pandemic, online meetings and teaching became the new way of communication and working. It was a challenging period, but the youth and junior development committee continued working to find opportunities to help MNA's in their development.

The IIHF Development Hub was launched on the IIHF website. This platform provides MNAs, Clubs and other stakeholders with supportive resources to organize and operate development and educational programs. However, it is important to note that these resources alone are not sufficient. They are to be utilized in planned and organized Programs which holistically help the respective people perform their duties to the best of their capabilities and potential.

We created The Player Development Guide (IIHF PDG) that aims to provide Member National Associations (MNA) and clubs with the necessary resources and guidance to run player development programs and to create new or to enhance existing long-term player development models and pathways. The IIHF PDG offers coaches, parents, heads of coaching and player development personnel within MNAs and clubs, not only information and guidance on the science behind long-term player development, but actual applicable content and information to conduct quality-training sessions. The Drill Hub is an important section in the IIHF PDG and provides training video's for skills, tactics and game situation roles for both on-ice and off-ice training and this in three skill levels: Beginner - Informing the MNA's about development related research is one of Intermediate - Advanced.


The Learn To Play Program was refreshed with a new layout. All illustrations were replaced by clear pictures and new practice manuals created. The IIHF Learn to Play Manual contains 367-pages of information on how to operate IIHF Learn to Play Programs, featuring sections on leadership, coaching basics, teaching, learning, organization, planning, playing rules and practice manuals.

Development Manager Aku Nieminen, who played a major role in creating the Hub, PDG, and LTP, ended his contract with the IIHF after 13 years. We want to thank Aku for his enthusiasm and hard work in all these years with the IIHF and wish him good luck in his future. As a secretary of the Youth and Junior Development Committee he was replaced by Johan Bollue as a secretary ad interim.

As part of the Growing the Game fund, the Finnish and the Swedish Ice Hockey Associations joined forces and conducted a game format analysis subsidized by the IIHF. The final report was presented and the results of the study led to playing formats for children and youth hockey. The Youth and Junior Development Committee used the study as a foundation for a Framework for Children and Youth hockey games. The final version of the Framework will be available in the autumn of 2021.

In order to help or inspire MNA's, the Youth and Junior Development Committee kicked off a new webinar platform called Skills4All. On a monthly basis topics were presented in a webinar for-

mat to help or inspire MNA's. The presented topics related to the actual situation with the pandemic and the foundations of development. A survey was held amongst the MNA's to summarize their needs.

After a general information session, in which the survey was presented, the Association of Denmark provided insight on their "Return to Ice Program" or what they do during COVID-19 and their action play in a post-COVID-19 environment.

the Youth and Junior Development Committee tasks. Two studies have been presented in the Skills4All webinars. First the Science of FUN was presented by Heather Mannix - American Development Model Manager for Female Hockey. Research was done to define a clear definition for FUN or how children define FUN. The study resulted in "The FUN maps". A second study was about the Youth and Junior Development formats presented by Kalle Valiaho, FIN and Anders Wahlström SWE.

In relation to the game formats the Lausanne YOG 3-on-3 format was reviewed by people who where involved in the event and considered as a format with a great future ahead.

Recruitment is the cornerstone for all development programs and will be key in any "return to ice program". The Youth and Junior Development Committee therefore paid attention by presenting some inspiring benchmarks. The Swedish and Swiss recruitment program was presented. In addition the recruitment program of the Swiss Federation, by Markus Graf, showed the importance of a quality management system.

DELIVERING THE MOST UNCONVENTIONAL WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP IN HOCKEY HISTORY

A pandemic bubble, varied rosters, and a change in host...there is no question the 2021 IIHF Ice Hockey World Championship was unique, both on and off the ice.

Detailed organization, a thorough health concept, and adaptability were key factors for Infront, the IIHF, and the Local Organizing Committee (LOC) to pull off a safe and successful tournament. The declining but still-present threat of COVID-19 brought various challenges for all stakeholders involved. First and foremost, the IIHF took the decision to award Latvia sole hosting responsibilities three months before the first game. To keep everyone safe, players and staff of all 16 teams and onsite staff from the IIHF, LOC and Infront were confined to the arenas and their hotels. They lived and played in a so-called "bubble" for the duration of the tournament, starting six days before the event began.

Furthermore, there were no spectators in the stadium for most of the games at Arena Riga and the Olympic Sports Centre due to the public health restrictions in Latvia. However, fans could enjoy the action from the stands for the final group games and the playoff stage, provided they had an electronic vaccination certificate and a face mask. Considering the huge challenges posed by the pandemic, Infront, the IIHF and the LOC can be immensely proud of their remarkable achievement in hosting a safe and successful tournament, with zero positive COVID-19 tests. This year, automatically and professionally produced game clips using Al-driven technology continued to excite fans, reaching 46m video views on all social media platforms.

DIGITALLY OVERCOMING PANDEMIC RESTRICTIONS

Infront and the IIHF strove to continually improve and enhance the entire tournament experience, with a special focus on its joint digital strategy. While it is tough to beat the adrenaline-charged atmosphere in the arena, Infront ensured that ice hockey fans around the world were able to enjoy and engage with every aspect of the 2021 IIHF Ice Hockey World Championship.



The Total Ice Hockey Show podcast returned for a second year, with its integration in the IIHF app, providing over 20,000 interested fans with an in-depth analysis and review from the rink, as well as behind-the-scenes action. In order to drive further engagement with fans at home, Infront integrated four games into the IIHF app: fantasy game, predictor game, all star team and awards predictor. By the end of the tournament, 44.5k users had registered to the IIHF Fan Zone. Fans interacted greatly with the IIHF content posted to their Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, TikTok, Vkonakte and You-Tube channels, with an engagement number of 4.67m.

The Pregame Skate daily show that went live on YouTube and Facebook one hour before puck drop had a 9.26 percent higher engagement rate than all content posted during the period. Likewise, the use of social media influencers was a great success, reaching an audience of over 590,000.

CONTINUOUSLY ADDING VALUE FOR PARTNERS AND FANS

Infront further used its expertise in sponsor activation by seamlessly aligning the 12 Official Sponsors with the rink-side and digital action. Since the tournament offers the ideal platform for brand activations, Infront was able to secure four new partners in Crypto.com, Engelbert Strauss, Liga Stavok and Wolt for this year's tournament – all leaving an impact on fans. For example, Engelbert Strauss' new logo and branding was featured on the tournament ice machines for the first time, and Wolt presented the daily playing schedule online as a "meal of the day".

Also, long-time partners, such as ŠKODA and Tissot, enjoyed broad exposure once again. This year, fans were invited to upload a photograph of themselves on a specially designed ŠKODA page so they could feature in a cardboard cut-out in the arena. All participants received a dedicated electronic ticket of the game, on which their cut-out was displayed, and therefore could still be present as a fan in the arena. Tissot created a trivia challenge, promoted on IIHF channels, where fans who answered correctly could win a Tissot watch.

The success of the 2021 IIHF Ice Hockey World Championship again proves the strength of the ongoing collaboration between Infront and the IIHF. Now, the global hockey family is eager to reunite fully at the 2022 IIHF Ice Hockey World Championship in Tampere and Helsinki, Finland.

IIHF DIGITAL REPORT: ADAPTATION AND INNOVATION

Following a season without a World Championship, the IIHF Digital Team was more than ready to initate new and exciting offerings for fans.

> The first tournament of the year was the 2021 IIHF the social media sphere and beyond. World Junior Championship. With the restrictions imposed by COVID-19, which meant that fans would not be able to attend the tournament in person, the IIHF needed to pivot its content towards reaching the spectators following the tournament in their homes.

With all tournament staff teams having to undergo a four-day quarantine immediately on arrival in Edmonton, the IIHF reached out to the participating teams and worked with them to create engaging content that brought players close to the fans. While stuck in their hotel rooms, players got creative and made fun videos of their workouts and other quarantine activities, while also participating in live interviews and fan interactions on social media.

This type of remote-access content would develop further to become a theme during the season. While most fans were not able to watch their favorite players compete in IIHF tournaments, they were nevertheless able to interact with them online via the IIHF social media channels.

In preparation for the 2021 IIHF Ice Hockey World Championship, the Digital Team discussed other ways where the IIHF can leverage the international ice hockey community to promote the event across

In addition to featuring more live interviews and engaging directly with players on their social media channels, the digital team executed a strategy to leverage other content producers to help promote the tournament.

The first part of this strategy was to employ wellknown ice hockey social media influencers to discuss the tournament progress, share IIHF World Championship content to fans, and promote games and tournament actions on their social media channels. The second part of the strategy involved recruiting the most active and enthusiastic IIHF World Championship fans to generate content and share their own experiences watching the tournament. These "micro influencers" were a huge success, at minimal cost and with support from the digital team side there was a significant increase in audience size and more exposure to the IIHF and World Championship content, surpisingly even more so than with the more established or "macro" influencers.

Through the influencer program the IIHF was able to increase its global reach on social media, and draw more people to follow the tournament on television, via IIHF.com and the IIHF app.

The IIHF app continued to grow and develop more offerings for fans interested in the Worlds. Some of these new offerings included an all-new IIHF Fantasy Hockey game for the World Championship, along with award predictor and game predictor challenges that enabled fans to become more engaged in World Championship games and news beyond that of their favourite teams. With the return of the World Championship, it was also possible to revive the Totally Ice Hockey podcast and reintegrate each of the episodes directly into the app.

Prior to the first game of each day, fans were also able to turn into a live Pregame Skate show on Facebook, covering the top games of the day with interviews and behind-the-scenes footage from inside the bubble. This show created the most engagement among social media users when it was aired, with over 15% of fans watching choosing to interact with the show in the form or questions and comments submitted while the show was playing.

One of the main objectives of the Digital Team each year is to ensure that a close and fruitful collaboration is established early on between the IIHF writing team, the host broadcaster, and the technology and social media staff to create top-level comprehensive tournament coverage. This was evident on the IIHF.com website, which along with the usual stats and game stories was able to feature unique videos like player interviews and the Ref Cam. Progress continues to be made on the player and puck speed tracking, with shot speed being integrated into game statistic reports and other information being showcased on social posts.


In an effort to use technology to provide fans with new ways to collect memories from their favourite World Championship moments, the IIHF launched its first-ever Non-Fungible Tokens (NFTs), in the form of specially chosen WM moments from the IIHF Archive. Fans were able to purchase a limited number of unique video clips showing key World Championship moments involving their favourite teams. It was a new way of providing tangible memories for fans to hold on to, a sort of "digital hockey card" that is unique and can be traded or sold in the same way. This innovative approach to memorabilia will be used in new and exciting ways at the 2022 WM in Finland.

The IIHF/Infront Digital team is all about innovation, and with another positive effort backed by strong audience numbers, we look forward to enhancing our World Championship coverage going into 2022.

HOCKEY HALL OF FAME **REVIVES LEGENDS OF HOCKEY**

The impacts of COVID-19 over the past twelve months have been widespread while upending all of our lives in ways that we could have never imagined.

"Return to normal" is a succinct phrase of common purpose during these extraordinary times.

We have all seen how the pandemic has beset the sports world (from recreational to professional, and all levels in between) and the Hall applauds the incredible efforts of its institutional Members (NHL, NHLPA, IIHF, Hockey Canada and USA Hockey) in keeping our game at the forefront and giving fans an essential outlet. Likewise, the tourism and attractions sector is one of the hardest-hit by COVID-19. Despite having taken drastic measures to minimize the threat of the virus, attractions everywhere are experiencing unprecedented disruption from health and safety restrictions, including mandatory closures, which has led to severe economic impacts.

Since March 2020, the diligent efforts to stabilize the Hall's operations have been aided by a lifeline of government subsidies, collaboration among key stakeholders and the resilience of the Hockey Hall of Fame brand to sustain licensing income. While it is anticipated that there will be continuing challenges over the next two or three business cycles, the present circumstances reinforce the importance of partnerships that safeguard HHOF as one of Canada's premier destination attractions and cultural heritage institutions.

REVIVAL OF THE LEGENDS OF HOCKEY SERIES

In 1996, in collaboration with the Hockey Hall of Fame (HHOF), Vancouver filmmaker Derik Murray embarked on a special mission to chronicle the history of hockey in a five-part documentary series entitled Legends of Hockey. With an all-star cast of 40 HHOF Honoured Members, Legends of Hockey featured in-depth interviews with some of hockey's greatest players, telling their own stories and personal experiences in their own way, complemented by vintage archival film of their greatest on-ice moments. Four years later, vaulted by its critical success, came the sequel Legends of Hockey: The Second Season. This five-part sister series featured more than 30 HHOF Honoured Members.

The Legends of Hockey series won the Gemini Award, the highest order in Canadian television, and was a huge hit with hockey fans all around the world. Drawn from over 250 hours of captivating interviews from the original series and its sequel, Legends of Hockey: A Personal Journey followed with 52 halfhour episodes, each dedicated to one Legend. Beyond the Class of 1999, there has been no further production on the Legends of Hockey series.

As one of the key initiatives to help mitigate the severe impacts of COVID-19 on its operations, HHOF has teamed up with founding sponsor, TSN, to carry on the proud tradition of celebrating excellence through the

production of 10 new one-hour episodes of the Legends of Hockey series featuring "the players and plays of a lifetime" from the Class of 2000 to present.

The foundational content created for the new episodes will also be utilized via HHOF exhibits, podcasts, on-line features and outreach programs. As the definitive documentary series on this subject, Legends of Hockey will provide a national and global platform for HHOF to showcase stories of the game's greatest icons and to preserve them as part of its vast archival collection.

With HHOF fully engaged, and made possible through the support of project benefactors and content contributors, the revival of the Legends of Hockey series will entertain, educate and inspire hockey fans of all ages so that the legacy of our game continues to endure for generations to come.

LORD STANLEY'S VAULT

When the Hockey Hall of Fame moved to its current location in 1993, the jewel of the new facility was the magnificent bank building positioned at the corner of Yonge and Front Streets. Fittingly, the vault that served that same bank now serves as the home to hockey's most revered trophy, the original Stanley Cup, as well as its retired bands and associated championship rings. This past year, the Hall of Fame refurbished the area, aptly titled Lord Stanley's Vault, further elevating the stature of the exhibit and expanding the scope of treasures on display.

The Stanley Cup was donated by Lord Stanley of Preston, at the time, the Governor General of Canada. After witnessing a game at the 1889 Montreal Winter Carnival, Lord Stanley im-

mediately became charmed by the sport, and subsequently, through the encouragement of his children, acquired a trophy that was to be awarded "from year to year by the champion hockey team in the Dominion of Canada."

Its purchase price was 10 guineas (approximately \$50 at the Member in the Builder Category (Class of 2005) in recognition of his many accomplishments in hockey, including those as time) and is engraved 'From Stanley of Preston' along with the Stanley family crest on one side with the original name of the former president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association trophy -- 'Dominion Hockey Challenge Cup' -- on the other. > At the time, Fasel represented a massive change in perspective. He was succeeding Gunther Sabetzki, a respected leader but one whose vision for the IIHF didn't extend much beyond the borders of Europe and certainly didn't include closer connections to North America and the NHL.

> But Fasel believed future success of the organization depended on exactly those two things-closer ties with the pros of the NHL and expanding the IIHF family into regions outside the traditional countries of Europe.

"In 1992, FIBA and the NBA made a deal to create the "Dream Team" in Barcelona, so I felt we should have the same discussion with the IIHF and NHL," Fasel explained. "It was also the dream of Juan Antonio Samaranch to have the IOC and IIHF come together. But we could have not one "Dream Team" but six, from all of the top hockey countries. So in my speech for president, I talked about forming a close relationship with the NHL."

To that end, Fasel met with relatively new NHL commissioner Gary Bettman, who himself had been elected to his position by the NHL Board of Governors only a year earlier, and Bob Goodenow, then executive director of the NHL Players' Association. The meetings went smoothly because all parties were amenable to better relationships and to the NHL participating in the Olympics. They targeted Nagano in 1998, and the rest, as they say, is history.

It was also under Fasel that the IIHF's flagship event, the World Championship, expanded, from 12 teams to 16 in 1998. This was a strategic move by the president as he witnessed the hockey world change after perestroika, when the collapse of the Soviet Union created 15 new countries, most of them active in hockey, and the amicable split of Czechoslovakia created two more. Fasel believed it was vital that Eastern and Western Europe be well represented and that the Worlds could handle 16 teams.

It was during Fasel's early years that he, along with mentor Walter Bush, Jr. of the United States, also pushed hard to fully develop women's hockey. Starting in 1997 the IIHF made the Women's Worlds an annual event in non-Olympic years, and, of course, the women joined the NHLers in Nagano and produced some spectacular hockey at their first Olympics.

In 1997, Fasel and the IIHF also created its own Hall of Fame separate from the Hockey Hall of Fame in Toronto. Eligibility focused on international greatness and contributions to the game on the IIHF stage, not the NHL. In the last quarter century, the IIHF has inducted some 230 Players, Builders, and Officials-men and, importantly, women-giving the players of the past a home forever in the minds and hearts of hockey fans of today and yesterday, and motivating players of tomorrow to achieve similar greatness.

It was also under Fasel that junior hockey expanded. A U18 tournament for men was introduced in 1999, and in 2008 a similar tournament for women was adopted, giving all nations a place to develop and showcase teen talent. As well, the World Juniors grew and grew in Canada, becoming the second-most important event on the IIHF calendar. This enormous success spurred greater interest in Europe, and today the World Juniors attracts massive crowds every year between Boxing Day and January 5, no matter which country hosts the event.



René Fasel was born in Fribourg, Switzerland, in 1950 and came to love hockey through daily life. "When I was a kid, I would watch the games in Fribourg with my father," he recalled. "We could even watch games from the bridge. We saw only half the ice and it was windy and cold, and then we started to go to the games. I was playing football, too, but I loved hockey. I had a big heart but not so much talent to play, so when I was 21 years old, I decided to be a referee. I trained with the top team in Fribourg but played with the second team. As a referee, I could skate, and I had a pretty good brain."




The highlight of his officiating career came in 1980 when he was a linesman for five games at the U20 in Finland. After that, he became referee-in-chief for the Swiss federation, and because he was a vocal presence within the organization, he was soon named its president. Walter Bush then encouraged him to run for a seat on the IIHF Council, which he did only reluctantly, and he won.

"I laughed when he said that to me, and said the only vote I will get is my own! He told me I had nothing to lose. So I ran, and I made it. It just goes to show how important it is to be in the right place at the right time."

That timing again stood him in good stead in Venice, when he became IIHF president, and true to his word he worked tirelessly on expanding the IIHF family, which increased from 47 to 81 member nations during his presi-

Fasel was set to retire at the Semi-Annual Congress last year, but the pandemic left him with no choice but to remain its leader until a more stable time. But now he is ready to move on and accept new challenges, and he leaves behind an organization far stronger and richer than when he joined in 1994. His immediate induction into the IIHF Hall of Fame is uncontested, as few men in the Builder category have contributed as much to international hockey as he has.





CANADA UNDERDOGS WIN GOLD

Nick Paul scored at 6:26 of the first threeon-three unlimited overtime to give Canada its 21st all-time gold medal at the 2021 IIHF Ice Hockey World Championship.

The goal gave Canada a 3-2 win over Finland and avenges a 2019 loss at the hands of Suomi. It is Canada's third gold in the last six years.

While Canada is always a favourite to win gold, this year's edition was anything but a sure bet. In fact, Canada lost its first three games, and a fourth in a shootout to Finland on the final day of the preliminary round, qualifying for the playoffs only by fortuitous results elsewhere in the group.

Incredibly, the Canadians won six of their last seven games including playoff wins over ROC, USA, and Finland to win what is surely their most improbable of the 21 championships. No team in IIHF history at any top-level event has ever won gold after losing four games.

The U.S. defeated Germany 6-1 in the bronze medal game with Conor Garland leading the way with a goal and two assists. The Germans reached the medal round thanks to a quarter-final upset of Switzerland. The tournament was highlighted by close games and quite a few surprises coming from Kazakhstan (2-1 over Finland), Denmark (4-3 over Sweden), and Great Britain (4-3 over Belarus).

USA JUNIORS CAPTURE GOLD

Team USA won their fifth all-time gold medal with a flawless 2-0 win over Canada in the 2021 World Junior final. This was also the fifth time the North American teams met for gold.

Goaltender Spencer Knight was particularly sensational in the third period as Canada tried everything to get a goal. Shots were 15-1 in the last 20 minutes, and 34-21 overall for Canada, but Knight stopped them all.

With his two points, Trevor Zegras won the scoring title with 18 points to go with being named tournament MVP.

Earlier on the final day, captain Anton Lundell scored twice as Finland beat Russia 4-1 to win the bronze medal. It was Finland's first bronze medal since 2006 and seventh overall. In the 2010's, the Finns have won either gold (2014, 2016, 2019) or nothing.

The 2021 Juniors was the first IIHF event to be organized in a pandemic bubble, marking a successful milestone and providing an effective blueprint for the safe execution of succeeding tournaments like the U18, Women's, and Men's World Championships.

Over 100 million viewers worldwide tuned in to watch the 2021 IIHF World Junior Championship, which was broadcast in a record 12 countries.

CANADA RALLIES TO GOLD

Brennan Othmann and Logan Stankoven scored early and late in the second period to break a 2-2 tie and send Canada to a 5-3 gold-medal victory over Russia. The win gives Canada gold for the first time at the U18 since 2013.


Connor Bedard, at 15 years of age, became the youngest gold medallist in U18 history. He had a goal and assist while captain Shane Wright led the way with two goals and an assist. Matvei Michkov had a goal and two assists for Russia and led all scorers with 16 points in the tournament.

Canada fought back from 1-0 and 2-1 deficits in the first to make it a 2-2 tie after 20 minutes before turning on the jets in the middle 20 minutes. It was the first time Canada trailed all tournament.

In the bronze medal game, Sweden grabbed a two-goal first-period lead and pounded Finland 8-0. Isak Rosen led the attack with a pair of goals and netminder Carl Lindbom posted a 35-save shutout.

The U18s featured great performances from several bright prospects. At just 15-years-old, Connor Bedard, equalled Connor McDavid's Canadian points record (14) with endless highlight-reel plays. And Russian scoring champ and MVP Matvei Michkov, 16, racked up 12 goals – trailing only Alexander Ovechkin and Cole Caufield (14) – and 16 points.

GOLDEN GIRL STRIKES AGAIN

Marie-Philip Poulin scored the golden goal at 7:22 of the first overtime period to give Canada a 3-2 win over the United States. It was Canada's first gold medal at the IIHF Ice Hockey Women's World Championship since 2012 and ended a run of five in a row for their adversaries.

The three-on-three unlimited OT featured end-to-end action and several great chances. Poulin drove into the U.S. end and fired a shot over the glove of Nicole Hensley. It was Poulin's third tournament-winning golden goal, after the Olympics in 2010 and 2014, both against USA.

It was a game as thrilling and exciting as any played between the nations in the 31-year history of women's hockey at the IIHF. The Americans turned the table on Canada in the first, scoring the only two goals, but Canada stormed back to tie it in the second. The third was a wild affair that featured four penalties - three to Canada – but there was no fifth goal until the overtime.

Finland beat a gutsy Swiss team 3-1 to win the bronze medal game. Tanja Niskanen stepped up with a goal and an assist, and Ella Viitasuo and Petra Nieminen also scored for Finland.

This is Finland's all-time record 13th bronze medal at the IIHF Ice Hockey Women's World Championship. The Finns are also the defending Olympic bronze medalists from 2018.
